Investment Objective	To protect capital by investing in high quality fixed income securities and to generate capital appreciation by investing in equity and equity related instruments. The Scheme is 'oriented towards protection of capital' and 'not with guaranteed returns'. However, there is no assurance or guarantee that the investment objective of the Scheme will be achieved.
Options	None
Tenure of the Scheme	Tenure of Religare Capital Protection Oriented Fund - Series I is 3 years from the date of allotment. Units of the Scheme will be redeemed only on the Maturity Date/Final Redemption Date (or immediately succeeding Business Day if that day is not a Business Day)
Liquidity	The Units of the Scheme cannot be redeemed by the Unit holder directly with the Fund until the Maturity Date / Final Redemption Date. The Units of the Scheme will be listed on the capital market segment of the NSE. Unit holders can purchase/sell Units on a continuous basis on NSE like any other publicly traded stock. Further, the AMC/Mutual Fund may at its sole discretion list Units of the Scheme on any other recognized Stock Exchange(s). The trading of Units on NSE and any other Stock Exchange(s) on which the Units are listed will automatically get suspended one Business Day prior to the record date for redemption of Units on Maturity Date/Final Redemption Date. The price of the Units on the Stock Exchange(s) will depend on demand and supply at that point of time and underlying NAV. The AMC reserves the right to change the record date for redemption of Units on Maturity Date/Final Redemption Date. Unit holders whose name(s) appear on the list of beneficial owners as per the Depositories (NSDL/CDSL) records and / or the records of Registrar and Transfer Agents on the record date shall be eligible for receipt of maturity/redemption proceeds.
Dematerialization of Units	Unit holders will have an option to hold Units in dematerialized (electronic) form. Accordingly, the Units of the Scheme will be available in dematerialized (electronic) form. The applicant intending to hold Units in dematerialized form will be required to have a beneficiary account with a Depository Participant (DP) of NSDL/CDSL and will be required to mention in the application form DP Name, DP ID and Beneficiary Account Number with the DP at the time of subscribing to the Units during the NFO of the Scheme. The Units of the Scheme will be traded and settled on the Stock Exchange compulsorily in dematerialized (electronic) form. The AMC will make available the Annual Report of the Scheme within four months of the end of the financial year.

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Risk Factors

Standard Risk Factors:

- Investment in Mutual Fund Units involves investment risks such as trading volumes, settlement risk, liquidity risk, default risk including the possible loss of principal.
- As the price / value / interest rates of the securities in which the Scheme invests fluctuates, the value of your investment in the Scheme may go up or down depending on various factors and forces affecting the capital markets.
- Past performance of the Sponsor/AMC/Mutual Fund does not guarantee future performance of the Scheme.
- Religare Capital Protection Oriented Fund - Series I is the name of the Scheme does not in any manner indicate either the quality of the Scheme or its future prospects and returns.
- The Sponsor is not responsible or liable for any loss or shortfall resulting from the operations of the Scheme beyond the contribution of Rs. 1,50,000/- (Rupees One Lakh Fifty Thousand Only) made by it towards the corpus of the Mutual Fund.
- The present Scheme is not a guaranteed or assured return scheme.

Scheme Specific Risk Factors:

- The Scheme offered is **'oriented towards protection of capital'** and **'not with guaranteed returns'**. Further, the orientation towards protection of capital originates from the portfolio structure of the Scheme and not from any bank guarantee, insurance cover etc.

The risk associated with Equity and Equity Related Instruments, fixed income and money market instruments, investing in derivatives and securities lending are described below:

- **Risk associated with Equity and Equity Related Instruments:**

Equity and Equity Related Instruments by nature are volatile and prone to price fluctuations on a daily basis due to macro and micro economic factors. The value of Equity and Equity Related Instruments may fluctuate due to factors affecting the securities markets such as volume and volatility in the capital markets, interest rates, currency exchange rates, changes in law/policies of the Government, taxation laws, political, economic or other developments, which may have an adverse impact on individual securities, a specific sector or all sectors. Consequently, the NAV of the Units issued under the Scheme may be adversely affected.

Further, the Equity and Equity Related Instruments are risk capital and are subordinate in the right of payment to other securities, including debt securities.

Equity and Equity Related Instruments listed on the stock exchange carry lower liquidity risk, however, the Scheme's ability to sell these investments is limited by the overall trading volume on the stock exchanges. In certain cases, settlement periods may be extended significantly by unforeseen circumstances. The inability of the Scheme to make intended securities purchases due to settlement problems could cause the Scheme to miss certain investment opportunities. Similarly, the inability to sell securities held in the Scheme's portfolio may result, at times, in potential losses to the Scheme, should there be a subsequent decline in the value of securities held in the Scheme's portfolio.

The Scheme may invest in securities, which are not listed on the stock exchanges. These securities may be illiquid in nature

and carry a higher amount of liquidity risk, in comparison to securities that are listed on the stock exchanges or offer other exit options to the investor. The liquidity and valuation of the Scheme's investments due to its holdings of unlisted securities may be affected if they have to be sold prior to the target date of disinvestment.

- **Risk associated with Fixed Income and Money Market Instruments:**

Interest - Rate Risk

Fixed Income and Money Market Instruments run interest-rate risk. Generally, when interest rates rise, prices of existing fixed income securities fall and when interest rate falls, the prices increase. The extent of rise or fall in the price is a function of existing coupon, days to maturity, increase or decrease in the level of interest, credit quality, demand and supply. However, in case of Government securities as credit risk remains zero, their prices are influenced by the movement in interest rates in the financial system.

In the case of floating rate instruments, an additional risk could arise because of the changes in the spreads of floating rate instruments. With the increase in the spread of floating rate instruments, the price can fall and with decrease in spread of floating rate instruments, the prices can rise. Moreover, the floating rate instruments having a periodical interest rate reset carry lower interest rate risk compared to a fixed rate debt security. However, in the falling interest rate scenario, the returns on floating rate debt instruments may not be better than those on fixed rate debt instruments.

Credit Risk

Credit risk or default risk refers to the risk that the issuer of a fixed income security may default on interest payment or even in paying back the principal amount on maturity. Even where no default occurs, the price of a security may be affected because of change in the credit rating of the issuer/instrument and the price of a security goes down if the credit rating agency downgrades the rating of the issuer. In case of Government securities, there is minimal credit risk to that extent.

Different types of securities in which the Scheme would invest carry different types and levels of risk. Lower rated or unrated securities are more likely to react to developments affecting the market and credit risk than the highly rated securities which react primarily to movements in the general level of interest rates. Lower rated or unrated securities also tend to be more sensitive to economic conditions than higher rated securities.

Liquidity or Marketability Risk

This refers to the ease with which a security can be sold at or near to its valuation, i.e. yield-to-maturity (YTM). The primary measure of liquidity risk is the spread between bid price and offer price quoted by a dealer.

Fixed income securities can be either listed on a stock exchange or may be unlisted. Moreover, the securities that are listed on the stock exchange carry lower liquidity risk, but the ability to sell these securities is limited by the overall trading volumes and may lead to the Scheme incurring losses till the security is finally sold. Further, different segments of Indian financial markets have different settlement cycles and may be extended significantly by unforeseen circumstances.

While money market instruments are fairly liquid but lack a well developed secondary market, which may restrict the ability of the Scheme to sell such instruments.

Securities which are not quoted on the stock exchange(s) may be illiquid and can carry higher liquidity risk in comparison with securities which are listed on the stock exchange(s) and offer exit option to the investor including put option. The Scheme would invest in the securities which are not listed but offer attractive yields. This may however increase the risk of the portfolio.

Re-investment Risk

This refers to the interest rate risk at which the intermediate cash flows received from the securities in the Scheme including maturity proceeds are reinvested. Investments in fixed income securities may carry re-investment risk as interest rates prevailing on the interest or maturity due dates may differ from the original coupon of the debt security. Consequently, the proceeds may get invested at a lower rate.

- **Risks associated with Investing in Derivatives**

Derivative products are specialized instruments that require investment techniques and risk analysis different from those associated with stocks and bonds. Risks include risk of mispricing or improper valuation and the inability of the derivative to correlate perfectly with underlying assets, rates and indices, illiquidity risk whereby the Scheme may not be able to sell or purchase derivative quickly enough at a fair price.

- **Risks associated with Securities Lending**

As with other modes of extensions of credit, there are risks inherent to securities lending, including the risk of failure of the other party, in this case the approved intermediary, to comply with the terms of the agreement entered into between the lender of securities i.e. the Scheme and the approved intermediary. Such failure can result in the possible loss of rights to the collateral put up by the borrower of the securities, the inability of the approved intermediary to return the securities deposited by the lender and the possible loss of any corporate benefits accruing to the lender from the securities deposited with the approved intermediary. The Fund may not be able to sell such lent securities and this can lead to temporary illiquidity.

- **Risks associated with Short Selling**

The Scheme may enter into short selling transactions, subject to SEBI and RBI Regulations. Short positions carry the risk of losing money and these losses may grow unlimited theoretically if the price of the stock increases without any limit. This may result in major loss to the Scheme. At times, the participants may not be able to cover their short positions if the price increases substantially. If numbers of short seller try to cover their position simultaneously, it may lead to disorderly trading in the stock and thereby can briskly escalate the price even further making it difficult or impossible to liquidate short position quickly at reasonable prices. In additions, short selling also carries the risk of inability to borrow the security by the participants thereby requiring the participants to purchase the securities sold short to cover the position even at unreasonable prices.

- **Risk Factors associated with Trading of Units on Stock Exchange(s)**

- Although Units of the Scheme are to be listed on the Exchange, there can be no assurance that an active secondary market will develop or be maintained.

- The Units of the Scheme may trade above or below NAV. The NAV of the Scheme will fluctuate with changes in the market value of Scheme's holdings. The trading prices of Units of the Scheme will fluctuate in accordance with changes in their NAV as well as demand and supply of the Units of the Scheme in the market.

- Trading in Units of the Scheme on the exchange may be halted because of market conditions or for reasons that in view of exchange authorities or SEBI, trading in Units of the Scheme is not advisable. In addition, trading in Units of the Scheme is subject to trading halts caused by extraordinary market volatility and pursuant to Exchange and SEBI 'circuit filter' rules. There can be no assurance that the requirements of Exchange necessary to maintain the listing of Units of the Scheme will continue to be met or will remain unchanged.

- The Units will be issued in demat form through depositories. The records of the depository are final with respect to the number of Units available to the credit of Unit holder. Settlement of trades, repurchase of Units by the Mutual Fund on the Maturity Date / Final Redemption Date will depend upon the confirmations to be received from depository(ies) on which the Mutual Fund has no control.

- As the Units allotted under the Scheme will be listed on the Exchange, the Mutual Fund shall not provide for redemption/repurchase of Units prior to Maturity Date/Final Redemption Date of the Scheme.

- **Disclaimer of Rating Agency**

- The rating provided by ICRA Ltd. should not be treated as a recommendation to buy, sell or hold units issued under the Scheme.

B. Requirement of Minimum Investors in the Scheme

The Scheme shall have a minimum of 20 investors and no single investor shall account for more than 25% of the corpus of the Scheme. These conditions will be complied with immediately after the close of the NFO itself i.e. at the time of allotment. In case of non-fulfillment with the condition of minimum 20 investors, the Scheme shall be wound up in accordance with Regulation 39(2)(c) of SEBI (MF) Regulations automatically without any reference from SEBI. In case of non-fulfillment with the condition of 25% holding by a single investor on the date of allotment, the application to the extent of exposure in excess of the stipulated 25% limit would be liable to be rejected and the allotment would be effective only to the extent of 25% of the corpus collected. Consequently, such exposure over 25% limits will lead to refund within 5 Business Days (if applicable) of the date of closure of the New Fund Offer.

 - The Mutual Fund may disclose details of the investor's account and transactions there under to those intermediaries whose stamp appears on the application form. In addition, the Mutual Fund may disclose such details to the bankers, as may be necessary for the purpose of effecting payments to the investor. The Fund may also disclose such details to regulatory and statutory authorities/bodies as may be required or necessary.
 - Pursuant to the Provisions of Prevention of Money Laundering Act, 2002, if after due diligence, the AMC believes that any transaction is suspicious in nature as regards money laundering, failure to provide required documentation, information, etc. the AMC shall have absolute discretion to report such suspicious transactions to FIU-IND and / or to freeze the folios of the investor(s), reject any application(s) / allotment of units and effect mandatory redemption of unit holdings of the investor(s) at the applicable NAV subject to payment of exit lod, if any.

II. INFORMATION ABOUT THE SCHEME

A. TYPE OF THE SCHEME

Religare Capital Protection Oriented Fund - Series I is a 3 years Close Ended Capital Protection Oriented Scheme.

The tenure of the Scheme is 3 years from the date of allotment (including the date of allotment).

B. INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE

To protect capital by investing in high quality fixed income securities and to generate capital appreciation by investing in equity and equity related instruments.

The Scheme is 'oriented towards protection of capital' and 'not with guaranteed returns'.

However, there is no assurance or guarantee that the investment objective of the Scheme will be achieved.

C. ASSET ALLOCATION PATTERN

Under normal circumstances, the asset allocation of the Scheme would be as follows:

Note: The Scheme will invest only in such debt securities which mature on or before the maturity of the Scheme. Further debt component of the portfolio will have highest investment grade rating.

The Scheme will not invest in securitized debt.

The Scheme may use derivatives only for purposes of hedging and portfolio rebalancing. The maximum gross derivative position will be restricted to 50% of the net assets of the Scheme.

The cumulative gross exposure through debt, equity and derivative positions shall not exceed 100% of the net assets of the scheme, subject to provisions of SEBI circular dated August 18, 2010 w.r.t. investment in derivatives.

In addition to the instruments stated in the table above, the Scheme may enter into repos/reverse repos as may be permitted by RBI. From time to time, the Scheme may hold cash. A part of the net assets may be invested in the Collateralised Borrowing & Lending Obligations (CBLO) or repo or in an alternative investment as may be provided by RBI.

The Scheme may engage in short selling of securities in accordance with the framework relating to short selling and securities lending and borrowing specified by SEBI.

The Scheme shall not deploy more than 20% of its net assets in securities lending.

Pending deployment of the funds in securities in terms of investment objective of the Scheme, the AMC may park the funds of the Scheme in short term deposits of the Scheduled Commercial Banks, subject to the guidelines issued by SEBI vide its circular dated April 16, 2007, as may be amended from time to time.

Subject to the SEBI (MF) Regulations, the asset allocation pattern indicated above may change from time to time, keeping in view market conditions, market opportunities, applicable regulations and political and economic factors. It must be clearly understood that the percentages stated above are only indicative and not absolute. These proportions can vary substantially depending upon the perception of the fund manager, the intention being at all times to seek to protect the interests of the Unit holders. Change in the investment pattern for defensive considerations will be in the interest of unit holders and for short term only. The fund manager will restore asset allocation in line with the asset allocation pattern within 1 month. Further, the fund manager may alter allocation during subsequent deployment of funds provided deployment is generated out of appreciation in value of existing investments.

D. WHERE WILL THE SCHEME INVEST?

The corpus of the Scheme will be invested in debt & money market instruments, Equity & Equity Related Instruments and other permitted securities which will include but not limited to:

- **Equity and Equity Related Instruments:**

1. Equity share is a security that represents ownership interest in a company. It is issued to those who have contributed capital in setting up an enterprise.
2. Equity Related Instruments are securities which give the holder of the security right to receive Equity Shares on pre agreed terms. It includes convertible bonds, convertible debentures, equity warrants, convertible preference shares, equity derivatives etc.
3. Equity derivatives are financial instrument, generally traded on an exchange, the price of which is directly dependent upon (i.e., 'derived from') the value of equity shares or equity indices. Derivatives involve the trading of rights or obligations based on the underlying, but do not directly transfer property.
4. Derivatives:

Futures are exchange-traded contracts to sell or buy financial instruments for future delivery at an agreed price. There is an agreement to buy or sell a specified quantity of financial instrument on a designated future date at a price agreed upon by the buyer and seller at the time of entering into a contract. To make trading possible, the exchange specifies certain standardized features of the contract. A futures contract involves an obligation on both the parties to fulfill the terms of the contract.

SEBI has permitted futures contracts on indices and individual stocks with maturity of 1 month, 2 months and 3 months on a rolling basis. The futures contracts are settled on last Thursday (or immediately preceding trading day if Thursday is a trading holiday) of each month. Currently, the futures are settled in cash. The final settlement price is the closing price of the underlying stock(s)/index.

Option is a contract which provides the buyer of the option (also called holder) the right, without the obligation, to buy or sell a specified asset at the agreed price on or upto a particular date. For acquiring this privilege, the buyer pays premium (fee) to the seller. The seller on the other hand has the obligation to buy or sell specified asset at the agreed price and for this obligation he receives premium. The premium is determined considering number of factors such as the market price of the underlying asset/security, number of days to expiry, risk free rate of return, strike price of the option and the volatility of the underlying asset. Option contracts are of two types viz:

Call Option - The option that gives the buyer the right to buy specified quantity of the underlying asset at the strike price is a call option. The buyer of the call option (known as the holder of call option) can call upon the seller of the option (writer of the option) and buy from him the underlying asset at the agreed price at any time on or before the expiry of the option.

The seller (writer of the option) on the other hand has the obligation to sell the underlying asset if the buyer of the call option decides to exercise his option to buy.

Put Option - The right to sell is called put option. A Put option gives the holder (buyer) the right to sell specified quantity of the underlying asset at the strike price. The seller of the put option (one who is short Put) however, has the obligation to buy the underlying asset at the strike price if the buyer decides to exercise his option to sell.

There are two kind of options based on the date of exercise of right. The first is the European Option which can be exercised only on the maturity date. The second is the American Option which can be exercised on or before the maturity date.

- **Debt & Money Market Instruments:**

The Scheme will invest only in such debt securities which mature on or before the maturity of the Scheme. In case investment is made in instrument with maturity beyond the maturity of the Scheme, then such instrument will have a put option date (before the maturity date of the Scheme) and will be compulsorily exercised by the AMC. The Scheme will not invest in debt instruments (other than money market instruments) where the maturity of the debt instrument is more than 3 months prior to the maturity of the Scheme. Further debt instruments in the portfolio will have highest investment grade rating.

1. Certificate of Deposits (CDs) is a negotiable money market instrument issued by scheduled commercial banks and select all-India Financial Institutions that have been permitted by the RBI to raise short term resources. The minimum denomination of CD should be Rs. 1 Lac and in multiples of Rs. 1 Lac thereafter. The maturity period of CDs issued by the Banks is between 7 days to one year, whereas, in case of FIs, maturity is between one year to 3 years from the date of issue. CDs may be issued at a discount to face value. Banks/FIs can not buyback their own CDs before maturity.
2. Commercial Paper (CPs) is an unsecured negotiable money market instrument issued in the form of a promissory note, generally issued by the corporates, primary dealers and all India Financial Institutions as an alternative source of short term borrowings. They are issued at a discount to the face value as may be determined by the issuer. CP is traded in secondary market and can be freely bought and sold before maturity.
3. Treasury Bills (T-Bills) are issued by the Government of India to meet their short term borrowing requirements. T-Bills are issued for maturities of 91 days, 182 days and 364 days. T-bills are issued at a discount to their face value and redeemed at par.
4. Collateralised Borrowing and Lending Obligations (CBLO) is a money market instrument that enables entities to borrow and lend against sovereign collateral security. It is in electronic form. The maturity ranges from 1 day to 90 days and can also be made available upto 1 year. Central Government securities including T-bills are eligible securities that can be used as collateral for borrowing through CBLO.
5. Securities created and issued by the Central and State Governments as may be permitted by RBI, securities guaranteed by the Central and State Governments (including but not limited to coupon bearing bonds, zero coupon bonds and treasury bills). Central Government securities are sovereign debt obligations of the Government of India with zero-risk of default and issued on its behalf by RBI. They form part of Government's annual borrowing programme and are used to fund the fiscal deficit along with other short term and long term requirements. Such securities could be fixed rate, fixed interest rate with put/call option, zero coupon bond, floating rate bonds, capital indexed bonds, fixed interest security with staggered maturity payment etc. State Government securities are issued by the respective State Government in co-ordination with the RBI.
6. Non convertible debentures as well as bonds are securities issued by companies / institutions promoted / owned by the Central or State Governments and statutory bodies, which may or may not carry a Central/State Government guarantee, public and private sector banks, All India Financial Institutions, Private Sector companies. These instruments may be secured against the assets of the company or may be unsecured and are generally issued to meet the short term

and long term fund requirements. Rate of interest on such instruments would depend upon spread over corresponding Government security, perceived risk, rating, tenor etc. These instruments include fixed interest security with/without put/call option, floating rate bonds, zero coupon bonds. Frequency of the interest payment could be either monthly/quarterly/half-yearly or annually.

7. Floating rate debt instruments are debt instruments issued by Central government, State government, corporates, PSUs etc. with coupon reset periodically. The periodicity of reset could be daily, monthly, quarterly, half yearly and annually or any other periodicity as may be mutually agreed between the issuer and the Fund. The fund manager will have the flexibility to invest the debt component into floating rate debt securities in order to reduce the impact of rising interest rate in the economy. Short term debt consideration for this Scheme includes maintaining an adequate float to meet expenses and other liquidity needs.
8. Repo (Repurchase Agreement) or Reverse Repo is a transaction in which two parties agree to sell and purchase the same security with an agreement to purchase or sell the same security at a mutually decided future date and price. The transaction results in collateralized borrowing or lending of funds. When the seller sells the security with an agreement to repurchase it, it is Repo transaction whereas from the perspective of buyer who buys the security with an agreement to sell it at a later date, it is reverse repo transaction. Presently in India, G-Secs, State Government securities and T-Bills are eligible for Repo/Reverse Repo.
9. 'When, as and if issued' (commonly known as "when-issued" (WI)) security refers to a security that has been authorized for issuance but not yet actually issued. WI trading takes place between the time a new issue is announced and the time it is actually issued. All "when issued" transactions are on an "if" basis, to be settled if and when the actual security is issued. SEBI has on April 16, 2008, in principle allowed Mutual Funds to undertake 'When Issued (WI)' transactions in Central Government securities, at par with other market participants.

Transaction in a security on 'When Issued' basis shall be undertaken in the following manner.

- 'WI' transactions can be undertaken in the case of securities that are being reissued as well as newly issued, on a selective basis.
- 'WI' transactions would commence on the issue notification date and it would cease on the working day immediately preceding the date of issue.
- All 'WI' transactions for all trade dates will be contracted for settlement on the date of issue.
- At the time of settlement on the date of issue, trades in the 'WI' security will be netted off with trades in the existing security, in the case of reissued securities.
- 'WI' originating transaction may be undertaken only on NDS-OM. However, undertaking the cover leg of the 'WI' transactions is permitted even outside the NDS-OM platform, i.e., through telephone market.
- The transaction should be guaranteed by an approved Central counterparty namely Clearing Corporation of India Limited (CCIL).
- Only PDs can take a short position in the 'WI' market. In other words non-PD entities can sell the 'WI' security to any counterparty only if they have a preceding purchase contract for equivalent or higher amount.
- Open Position in the 'WI' market are subject to the following limits:

10. Bills Rediscounting.
11. Any other Scheme of Religare Mutual Fund or of any other mutual fund provided such investment is in conformity with the investment objective of the Scheme. Such investment will be subject to limits specified under SEBI (MF) Regulations and AMC will not be entitled to charge management fees on such investments.
12. Derivative Instrument like Interest Rate Swaps, Forward Rate Agreement and such other derivative instruments as may be permitted under the Regulations.
 - Interest Rate Swap - An Interest Rate Swap (IRS) is a financial contract between two parties exchanging or swapping a stream of interest payments for a "notional principal" amount on multiple occasions during a specified period. Such contracts generally involve exchange of a "fixed to floating" or "floating to fixed rate" of interest. Accordingly, on each payment date that occurs during the swap period, cash payments based on fixed/ floating and floating rates are made by the parties to one another.
 - Forward Rate Agreement - A Forward Rate Agreement (FRA) is a financial contract between two parties to exchange interest payments for a 'notional principal' amount on settlement date, for a specified period from start date to maturity date. Accordingly, on the settlement date, cash payments based on contract (fixed) and the settlement rate, are made by the parties to one another. The settlement rate is the agreed bench-mark/ reference rate prevailing on the settlement date.
13. Pending deployment of funds as per the investment objective of the Scheme, the funds may be parked in short term deposits of the Scheduled Commercial Banks, subject to guidelines and limits specified by SEBI.
14. Any other domestic debt securities as permitted by SEBI/RBI from time to time.

The securities / instruments mentioned above and such other securities that the Scheme is permitted to invest in would be rated and could be listed, unlisted, privately placed, secured, unsecured and maturing normally in line with the maturity of the Scheme. The securities may be acquired through initial public offering (IPOs), secondary market, private placement, rights offers, negotiated deals. Further investments in debentures, bonds and other fixed income securities will be in instruments which have been assigned investment grade rating by the credit rating agency.

Debt and Money Markets in India

The Indian debt market is today one of the largest in Asia and includes securities issued by the Government (Central & State Governments), public sector undertakings, other government bodies, financial institutions, banks and corporates. Government and Public Sector Enterprises are the predominant borrowers in the markets. The major players in the Indian debt markets today are banks, financial institutions, mutual funds, insurance companies, primary dealers, trusts, pension funds and corporates.

The Indian debt market is the largest segment of the Indian financial markets. The debt market comprises broadly two segments, viz., Government securities market or G-Sec market and corporate debt market. The latter is further classified as market for PSU bonds and private sector bonds. The Government securities (G-sec) market, with market capitalization of Rs. 21,53,658 Crores as at March 31, 2010 (Source: CCIL), is the oldest and the largest component of the Indian debt market in terms of market capitalization, outstanding securities and trading volumes. The outstanding dated securities of the Government of India is Rs. 18,26,774 Crores as on December 2009 as compared to Rs. 14,16,443 Crores as on December 2008 (Source: Economic Survey, 2009-2010). The G-Secs market plays a vital role in the Indian economy as it provides

the benchmark for determining the level of interest rates in the country through the yields on the government securities which are referred to as the risk-free rate of return in any economy. Over the years, there have been new products introduced by the RBI like zero coupon bonds, floating rate bonds, inflation indexed bonds, etc. The corporate bond market, in the sense of private corporate sector raising debt through public issuance in capital market, is only an insignificant part of the Indian debt market. The total traded volume in corporate bonds during April-December 2009 was Rs. 2,42,686 Crores vis-à-vis Rs. 88,750 Crores during April-December 2008. (Source: Economic Survey, 2009-2010). A large part of the issuance in the non-Government debt market is currently on private placement basis.

The money markets in India essentially consist of the call money market (i.e. market for overnight and term money between banks and institutions), repo transactions (temporary sale with an agreement to buy back the securities at a future date at a specified price), commercial papers (CPs, short term unsecured promissory notes, generally issued by corporates), certificate of deposits (CDs, issued by banks) and Treasury Bills (issued by RBI). In a predominantly institutional market, the key money market players are banks, financial institutions, insurance companies, mutual funds, primary dealers and corporates.

In money market, activity levels of the Government and non-government debt vary from time to time. Instruments that comprise a major portion of money market activity include but not limited to:

- Overnight Call
- Collateralised Borrowing & Lending Obligations (CBLO)
- Repo/Reverse Repo Agreement
- Treasury Bills
- Government Securities with a residual maturity of < 1 year.
- Commercial Paper
- Certificate of Deposit

Apart from these, there are some other options available for short tenure investments that include MIBOR linked debentures with periodic exit options and other such instruments. Though not strictly classified as money market instruments, PSU / DFI / Corporate paper with a residual maturity of < 1 year, are actively traded and offer a viable investment option.

The following table gives approximate yields prevailing on February 7, 2011 on some of the instruments. These yields are indicative and do not indicate yields that may be obtained in future as interest rates keep changing consequent to changes in macro economic conditions and RBI policy.

The price and yield on various debt instruments fluctuate from time to time depending upon the macro economic situation, inflation rate, overall liquidity position, foreign exchange scenario etc. Also, the price and yield vary according to maturity profile, credit risk etc.

SECURITIES LENDING

Securities lending means the lending of securities to another person or entity for a fixed period of time, at a negotiated compensation in order to enhance returns of the portfolio. The securities lent will be returned by the borrower on the expiry of the stipulated period.

Subject to the SEBI (MF) Regulations, the Scheme may engage

in securities lending. Such lending shall be made when in view of the fund manager, such lending could provide reasonable returns commensurate with risks associated with such lending and shall be made in accordance with the investment objective of the Scheme. The Scheme shall not deploy more than 20% of its net assets in securities lending.

STOCK SELECTION PROCESS

Based on the fund objective, we start filtering down the possible investment universe to more attractive opportunities. The process involves company, industry, economic and technical analysis in alignment with the investment objective of the underlying fund. The fund's investment objective has implications for definition of the universe, company selection, industry and asset allocation.

- **Matrix Analysis**

As part of the Matrix approach we analyze, bottom up, the fundamentals of the companies that are part of the universe. We use external research and find it useful as a source of information and financial models. However, we believe our direct and in-depth interaction with a company and its competitors, suppliers and buyers-wherever feasible and possible, helps us arrive at our own unique insight into the company. The maximum inefficiency in the markets is at the company level and an in-depth research effort can generate a knowledge advantage and superior performance.

To this, we add our top down economic views and industry views- leading to industry and asset allocation decisions. The economic and industry analysis also has its implications on company selection. Technical analysis is another input for asset allocation decisions. All of this is in keeping with the investment objective of the specific fund.

- **Security Selection**

To help select stocks for the portfolio, we use a proprietary stock categorization system. The objective of our stock categorization system is to enable us to identify stocks that are likely to be the best investments from within our universe. Each category of stock has a description of fundamental attributes that we expect the company to possess. The categorizations are as follows:

Stocks that fit into one of these categories typically display superior return profiles, but more importantly this enables fund managers to

focus on the attributes that drive stock price performance and keep a watch for red flags.

The financial parameters under stock selection process are explained as follows:

- Margin - EBITDA margin or PAT Margin
 - EBITDA - Earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization.
 - EBITDA Margin - Earning before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization/Revenues
 - PAT - Profit after Tax
 - PAT margin- Profit after Tax/Revenues
- Return on Equity (ROE) - Profit after Tax/Net Worth
- Net worth - Equity share capital + Reserves
- ROE Expansion - increasing trend in ROE over time
- Value of Asset or business - Market or replacement value of the assets after accounting for liabilities
- Operating Leverage - Sensitivity of margins to increase in revenues
- Profit Leverage - Sensitivity of Profits (EBITDA or PAT) to changes in unit price or total revenues
- Path 2 Profit - refers to the various levers such as, but not limited to, cost reduction, revenue growth, revenue mix, discontinuing of a product/business, asset sales, change in capital structure that a company might adopt to improve profitability/reduce losses.

- **Portfolio Construction**

The fund manager has the primary responsibility for portfolio construction based on the investment objective of the Scheme. Portfolio construction guidelines are laid down for each fund and reviewed on a need basis and otherwise regularly on a quarterly basis. Every investment decision we make is by keeping in mind the investment objective of the Scheme and how the security will affect the overall portfolio. In addition, we also look into the current economic / industry views that impact industry and asset allocation decisions for the fund. Technical views which are relevant to asset allocation, if applicable are also taken into consideration. Our preference is for companies with the characteristics as defined in our stock categorization framework.

- **Sell Discipline**

We may sell a stock because the fundamentals of a company, industry or economy have changed or a company's competitive advantage appears to have deteriorated. It could also be a function of alternative opportunities being available at a more attractive valuation or an inability to justify prevailing valuations.

- **Oversight**

The role of monitoring and reviewing is undertaken by the investment committee consisting of Chief Executive Officer, Head - Equity Funds, Head - Fixed Income and Head - Compliance & Risk and by any additional member which may be included/ nominated to the committee which meets on a periodic basis. The committee is empowered to establish internal norms such as industry allocation, asset allocation etc for each fund and to monitor and review this on an ongoing basis.

E. INVESTMENT STRATEGY

Religare Capital Protection Oriented Fund is a close ended fund that is oriented towards protection of capital (which originates from its portfolio structure) and generate capital appreciation by investing in a portfolio of high quality fixed income securities and Equity & Equity Related Instruments. The Scheme will invest predominantly in fixed income securities of highest investment grade rating (range being 80%-100%) that are maturing in line with the duration of the Scheme and which would have the potential to grow over the tenure of the fund with an intention to protect capital at the time of maturity. For the fixed income portion, the Scheme will follow a passive investment strategy except in cases where the Scheme is selling to liquidate

instruments whose credit quality has gone below LAAA equivalent to maintain the rating of the portfolio. The balance amount will be invested in equities to benefit from the growth potential of the stock market in the long run. Investment in stocks will be made by using a combination of top down and bottom up investment approach. The fund manager would endeavour that the capital remains protected on maturity and also ensure that the scheme rating is not adversely affected. The Scheme shall ensure capital protection by adopting a static hedge approach. Capital protection will be provided solely through the fixed income part of the portfolio and the same shall be invested in securities that mature to the capital value at the end of the scheme.

Due diligence by Religare AMC to ensure that the portfolio is suitable for orientation of capital protection:

Investment team has a dedicated two member team of credit analysts for conducting the due-diligence and thorough analysis of each company. The due diligence process includes studying economic risk, industry risk, business risk, financial risk and management risk. The credit analyst prepares a detailed report based on the credit approval model. The model takes into account both qualitative and quantitative parameters. The research report is prepared after carefully studying the sector in which the company operates, track record of company and sponsor/parent of company in terms of their financials and any defaults to their creditors, meeting the management and taking the views of the rating agency. The report from the credit analyst is an independent opinion based on the credit risk analysis. The AMC would ensure that appropriate risk mitigating measures are in place throughout the tenure of portfolio i.e. right from the beginning of the portfolio construction phase. It involves all tenets of independent credit risk analysis, adequate diversification of the portfolio and maturity of securities being in line with the maturity of the portfolio. In order to ensure adequate independent risk management, the AMC will ensure independence through credit risk analysis of all the intended credits.

Further, the AMC will undertake the following due diligence process to ensure the security is suitable for the portfolio;

- Only AAA rated securities (highest investment grade rated securities) will form part of the portfolio. Yield on such securities (at the time of investment) will not be more than 100 basis points over the yield of AAA securities as per CRISIL/ICRA matrix/CRISIL Aggregator.
- The Scheme may invest in floating rate debt instruments with floor and cap price. However, spread between floor and cap price shall not exceed 10 basis points.
- Duration mismatch will not be more than 3 months.
- The Scheme will invest only in such debt securities which mature on or before the maturity of the Scheme.
- The fund management team will ensure appropriate level of diversification in order to construct a portfolio high on current yield with low risk.
- In respect of investment in securities issued by Banks/NBFCs, the issuer shall have the minimum capital adequacy ratio prescribed by the Reserve Bank of India.

The Scheme shall not invest in debt securities issued by corporate operating in real estate, textile and gems and jewellery.

The steps taken to avoid conflict of interest in the case of rating agency:

- In order to exhibit low co-relation between ICRA and individual securities ratings the Scheme will invest not more than 20% of its net assets in instruments (at the time of investment) where ICRA is the credit rating agency. In computing the ceiling of 20%, the securities issued by Public Sector undertakings, nationalized banks and government companies will be excluded.
- As an internal policy, fund managers can buy any instrument only after the approval of the credit and within the limits set by the

team of Credit Analysts. Clear segregation of independent credit analysis by Credit Analyst and subsequent investment by fund manager would resolve conflict of interest.

- Investment in instruments rated by ICRA (either single rated or dual rated) will be made only after approval of Investment Committee.

Risk Control

Risk is an inherent part of the investment function. Effective risk management is critical to fund management for achieving financial soundness. Investments by the Scheme shall be made as per the investment objective of the Scheme and provisions of SEBI (MF) Regulations. AMC has incorporated adequate safeguards to manage risk in the portfolio construction process. Risk control would involve managing risk in order to keep it in line with the investment objective of the Scheme. The risk control process involves identifying & measuring the risk through various Risk measurement tools like but not limited to VAR, tracking error etc. Further AMC has implemented Bloomberg Portfolio Management System as Front Office System (FOS) for managing risk. The system has inbuilt feature which enables the fund manager to calculate various risk ratios, average duration and analyze the same.

INVESTMENT IN DERIVATIVES

The Scheme may use various derivative instruments which are permissible under the applicable Regulations for the purpose of hedging and portfolio rebalancing and shall also be subject to the investment objective and strategy of the Scheme and the internal limits if any, as laid down from time to time. These include but are not limited to futures (both stock and index) and options (stock and index).

Derivatives are financial contracts of pre-determined fixed duration, like stock futures/options and index futures and options, whose values are derived from the value of an underlying primary financial instrument such as interest rates, exchange rates, commodities, and equities.

Derivatives can be either exchange traded or can be over the counter (OTC). Exchange traded derivatives are listed and traded on stock exchanges whereas OTC derivative transactions are generally structured between two counterparties.

The risks associated with derivatives are similar to those associated with equity investments. The additional risks could be on account of

- Illiquidity;
- Potential mis - pricing of the Futures/Options;
- Inability of derivatives to correlate perfectly with the underlying (Indices, Assets, Exchange Rates)
- Cost of hedge can be higher than adverse impact of market movements;
- An exposure to derivatives in excess of the hedging requirements can lead to losses;
- An exposure to derivatives can also limit the profits from a genuine investment transaction.

Exchange traded derivative contracts in stocks and indices in India are currently cash settled at the time of maturity/ expiry.

Concepts and Examples

Futures

Futures (Index & Stocks) are forward contracts traded on the exchanges & have been introduced both by BSE and NSE. Generally futures of 1 month (*near month*), 2 months (*next month*) and 3 months (*far month*) are presently traded on these exchanges. These futures expire on the last working Thursday of the respective months.

Illustration with Index Futures

In case the Nifty near month future contract is trading at say, Rs. 3,500,

and the fund manager has a view that it will depreciate going forward; the Scheme can initiate a sale transaction of Nifty futures at Rs. 3,510 to the extent of the value of portfolio (equity stocks and other underlying long equity position). Once the price falls to Rs. 3,400 after say, 20 days, the Scheme can initiate a square-up transaction by buying the said futures and book a profit of Rs. 110.

Correspondingly, if the fund manager has a positive view he can initiate a long position in the index/stock futures subject to the extant regulations.

There are futures based on stock indices as mentioned above as also futures based on individual stocks. The profitability of index /stock future as compared to an individual security will inter-alia depends upon:

- The carrying cost,
- The interest available on surplus funds, and
- The transaction cost.

Example of a typical future trade and the associated costs

Few strategies using stock /index futures for hedging and portfolio rebalancing:

(1) **Selling spot and buying future:** In case the Scheme holds the stock of a company “A” at say Rs. 100 while in the futures market it trades at a discount to the spot price say at Rs. 98, then the Scheme may sell the stock and buy the futures.

On the date of expiry of the stock future, the Scheme may reverse the transactions (i.e. buying at spot & selling futures) and earn a risk-free Rs. 2 (2% absolute) on its holdings without any dilution of the view of the fund manager on the underlying stock.

Further, the Scheme can still benefit from any movement of the price in the upward direction, i.e. if on the date of expiry of the futures, the stock trades at Rs. 110 which would be the price of the futures too, the Scheme will have a benefit of Rs 10 whereby the Scheme gets the 10% upside movement together with the 2% benefit on the arbitrage and thus getting a total return of 12%. The corresponding return in case of holding the stock would have been 10%.

Note: The same strategy can be replicated with a basket of nifty-50 stocks (Synthetic NIFTY) and the Nifty future index.

(2) **Buying spot and selling future:** Where the stock of a company “A” is trading in the spot market at Rs. 100 while it trades at Rs. 102 in the futures market, then the Scheme may buy the stock at spot and sell in the futures market thereby earning Rs. 2.

Buying the stock in cash market and selling the futures results into a hedge where the Scheme has locked in a spread and is not affected by the price movement of cash market and futures market. The arbitrage position can be continued till expiry of the future contracts when there is a convergence between the cash market and the futures market. This convergence enables the

Scheme to generate the arbitrage return locked in earlier.

(3) **Buying/selling stock future:** When the Scheme wants to initiate a long position in a stock whose spot price is at say, Rs.100 and futures is at 98, then the Scheme may just buy the futures contract instead of the spot thereby benefiting from a lower cost.

In case the Scheme has a bearish view on a stock which is trading in the spot market at Rs.98 and the futures market at say Rs. 100, the Scheme may initiate a short position in the futures contract. In case the prices align with the view and the price depreciates to say Rs. 90, the Scheme can square up the short position thereby earning a profit of Rs.10 vis-à-vis a fall in stock price of Rs 8.

(4) The Scheme will seek to generate returns by superior stock selection and removing market risks by selling appropriate index. For example, one can seek to generate positive returns by buying a bank stock and selling Bank Nifty future. Both the leg of transactions would be considered for purpose of exposure.

Risk associated with these strategies:

1. Lack of opportunities;
2. Inability of derivatives to correlate perfectly with the underlying security; and
3. Execution risk, whereby ultimate execution takes place at a different rates than those devised by the strategy.

Execution of these strategies depends upon the ability of the fund manager to identify and execute based on such opportunities. These involve significant uncertainties and decision of fund manager may not always be profitable. No assurance can be given that the fund manager will be able to identify or execute such strategies.

Option Contracts (Stock and Index)

An Option gives the buyer the right, but not the obligation, to buy (call) or sell (put) a stock at an agreed-upon price during a certain period of time or on a specific date.

Options are used to manage risk or as an investment to generate income. The price at which underlying security is contracted to be purchased or sold is called the Strike Price.

Options that can be exercised on or before the expiration date are called American Options while, Options that can be exercised only on the expiration date are called European Options.

Note: The above table is for the purpose of explaining concept of options contract. As per the current Regulations, the Scheme can not write option or purchase instrument with embedded write option.

Option contracts are of two types - Call and Put.

Call Option: A call option gives the buyer, the right to buy specified quantity of the underlying asset at the set strike price on or before expiration date and the seller (writer) of call option however, has the obligation to sell the underlying asset if the buyer of the call option decides to exercise the option to buy.

Put Option: A put option gives the buyer the right to sell specified quantity of the underlying asset at the set strike price on or before expiration date and the seller (writer) of put option however, has the obligation to buy the underlying asset if the buyer of the put option decides to exercise his

option to sell.

Index Options/Stock Options

Index options/Stock options are termed to be an efficient way of buying/selling an index/stock compared to buying/selling a portfolio of physical shares representing an index for ease of execution and settlement. The participation can be done by buying/selling either Index futures or by buying a call/put option.

The risks are also different when index/stock futures are bought/sold vis-a-vis index/stocks options as in case of an index future there is a mark to market variation and the risk is much higher as compared to buying an option, where the risk is limited to the extent of premium paid.

In terms of provision of SEBI circular dated August 18, 2010, the Scheme shall not write options or purchase instruments with embedded written options.

The illustration below explains how one can gain using Index call/put option. These same principals of profit/loss in an Index option apply in Toto to that for a stock option.

Call Option

Suppose an investor buys a Call option on 1 lot of CNX Nifty (Lot Size: 50 units)

- Nifty index (European option).
- Nifty 1 Lot Size: 50 units
- Spot Price (S): 3500
- Strike Price (X): 3550 (Out-of-Money Call Option)
- Premium: 100

Total Amount paid by the investor as premium $[50 \times 100] = 5000$

There are two possibilities i.e. either the index moves up over the strike price or remains below the strike price.

Case 1 - The index goes up

- **An investor sells the Nifty Option described above before expiry:**
Suppose the Nifty index moves up to 3600 in the spot market and the premium has moved to Rs 200 and there are **15 days more left for the expiry**. The investor decides to reverse his position in the market by **selling** his 1 Nifty call option as the option now is **In the Money**.

His gains are as follows:

- Nifty Spot: 3600
- Current Premium: Rs.200
- Premium paid: Rs.100
- Net Gain: $Rs.200 - Rs.100 = Rs.100$ per unit
- Total gain on 1 lot of Nifty (50 units) = $Rs.5000 (50 \times 100)$

In this case the premium of Rs.200 has an intrinsic value of Rs.50 per unit and the remaining Rs.150 is the time value of the option.

- **An investor exercises the Nifty Option at expiry**

Suppose the Nifty index moves up to 3700 in the spot market on the expiry day and the investor decides to reverse his position in the market by exercising the Nifty call option as the option now is **In The Money**.

His gains are as follows:

- Nifty Spot: 3700
- Premium paid: Rs.100
- Exercise Price: 3550
- Receivable on exercise: $3700 - 3550 = 150$
- Total Gain: $Rs.2500 \{ (150 - 100) \times 50 \}$

In this case the realised gain is only the intrinsic value, which is Rs.50, and there is no time value.

Case 2 - The Nifty index moves to any level below 3550

Then the investor does not gain anything but on the other hand his loss is limited to the premium paid:

Net Loss is Rs.5000 (Loss is capped to the extent of Premium Paid) (Rs 100 Premium paid * Lot Size: 50 units).

Put Option

Suppose an investor buys a Put option on 1 lot of CNX Nifty.

- Nifty 1 Lot Size: 50 units
- Spot Price (S): 3500
- Strike Price (X): 3450 (Out-of-Money Put Option)
- Premium: 30
- Total Amount paid by the investor as premium $[50 \times 30] = 1500$
There are two possibilities i.e. either the index moves over the strike price or moves below the strike price.

Let us analyze these scenarios.

Case 1 - The index goes down

- **An investor sells the Nifty Option before expiry:**

Suppose the Nifty index moves down to 3400 in the spot market and the premium has moved to Rs. 80 and there are **15 days more left for the expiry**. The investor decides to reverse his position in the market by **selling** his 1 Nifty Put Option as the option now is **In The Money**. His gains are as follows:

- Nifty Spot: 3400
- Premium paid: Rs.30
- Net Gain: $Rs.80 - Rs.30 = Rs.50$ per unit
- Total gain on 1 lot of Nifty (50 units) = $Rs.2500 (50 \times 50)$

In this case the premium of Rs.80 has an intrinsic value of Rs.50 per unit and the remaining Rs.30 is the time value of the option.

An investor exercises the Nifty Option at expiry (It is an European Option)

Suppose the Nifty index moves down to 3400 in the spot market on the expiry day and the investor decides to reverse his position in the market by exercising the Nifty Put Option as the option now is **In The Money**.

His gains are as follows:

- Nifty Spot: 3400
- Premium paid: Rs.30
- Exercise Price: 3450
- Gain on exercise: $3450 - 3400 = 50$
- Total Gain: $Rs.1000 \{ (50 - 30) \times 50 \}$

In this case the realised amount is only the intrinsic value, which is Rs.50, and there is no time value in this case.

Case 2 - If the Nifty index stays over the strike price which is 3450, in the spot market then the investor does not gain anything but on the other hand his loss is limited to the premium paid.

- Nifty Spot: >3450
- Net Loss Rs.1500 (Loss is capped to the extent of Premium Paid) (Rs 30 Premium paid * Lot Size: 50 units).

Risk Associated with these Strategies

- The risk of mis-pricing or improper valuation and the inability of derivatives to correlate perfectly with underlying assets, rates and indices.
- Execution Risk: The prices which are seen on the screen need not be the same at which execution will take place.

The Scheme may also use derivative instruments like Interest rate swaps like Overnight indexed swaps (OIS), forward rate agreements or such other derivative instruments as may be permitted under the Regulations. Derivatives will be used for the purpose of hedging, increasing the returns of the Scheme and portfolio balancing or

such other purpose as may be permitted under the Regulations and Guidelines from time to time.

Using Overnight Indexed Swaps

In a rising interest rate scenario, the Scheme may enhance returns for the investor by hedging the risk on its fixed interest paying assets by entering into an OIS contract where the Scheme agrees to pay a fixed interest rate on a specified notional amount, for a pre determined tenor and receives floating interest rate payments on the same notional amount. The fixed returns from the Scheme's assets and the fixed interest payments to be made by the Scheme on account of the OIS transaction offset each other and the Scheme benefits on the floating interest payments that it receives.

The Scheme may enter into an opposite position in case of a falling interest rate scenario, i.e. to hedge the floating rate assets in its portfolio the Scheme enters into an OIS transaction where it receives a fixed interest rate on a specified notional amount for a specified time period and pays a floating interest rate on the same notional amount. The floating interest payments that the Scheme receives on its floating rate securities and the floating interest payments that the Scheme has to pay on account of the OIS transaction offset each other and the Scheme benefits on the fixed interest payments that it receives in such a scenario.

Swap

Assume that the Scheme has a Rs. 20 crore floating rate investment linked to MIBOR (Mumbai Inter Bank Offered Rate). Hence, the Scheme is currently running an interest rate risk and stands to lose if the interest rate moves down. To hedge this interest rate risk, the Scheme can enter into a 6 month MIBOR swap. Through this swap, the Scheme will receive a fixed predetermined rate (assume 12%) and pays the "benchmark rate" (MIBOR), which is fixed by the NSE or any other agency such as Reuters. This swap would effectively lock-in the rate of 12% for the next 6 months, eliminating the daily interest rate risk. This transaction is usually routed through an intermediary who runs a book and matches deals between various counterparties.

The steps will be as follows:

Assuming the swap is for Rs. 20 Crores for June 1, 2009 to December 1, 2009. The Scheme is a fixed rate receiver at 12% and the counterparty is a floating rate receiver at the overnight rate on a compounded basis (say NSE MIBOR).

On June 1, 2009 the Scheme and the counterparty will exchange only a contract of having entered this swap. This documentation would be as per International Swap Dealers Association (ISDA) norms.

On a daily basis, the benchmark rate fixed by NSE will be tracked by them.

On December 1, 2009 they will calculate the following:

- The Scheme is entitled to receive interest on Rs. 20 Crores at 12% for 184 days i.e. Rs. 1.21 Crores, (this amount is known at the time the swap was concluded) and will pay the compounded benchmark rate.
- The counterparty is entitled to receive daily compounded call rate for 184 days & pay 12% fixed.
- On December 1, 2009, if the total interest on the daily overnight compounded benchmark rate is higher than Rs. 1.21 Crores, the Scheme will pay the difference to the counterparty. If the daily compounded benchmark rate is lower, then the counterparty will pay the Scheme the difference.
- Effectively the Scheme earns interest at the rate of 12% p.a. for six months without lending money for 6 months fixed, while the counterparty pays interest @ 12% p.a. for 6 months on Rs. 20 Crores, without borrowing for 6 months fixed.

The above example illustrates the benefits and risks of using derivatives

for hedging and optimizing the investment portfolio. Swaps have their own drawbacks like credit risk, settlement risk. However, these risks are substantially reduced as the amount involved is interest streams and not principal.

Forward Rate Agreement

Assume that on June 30, 2009, the 30 day commercial paper (CP) rate is 6.75% and the Scheme has an investment in a CP of face value Rs. 50 Crores, which is going to mature on July 31, 2009. If the interest rates are likely to remain stable or decline after July 31, 2009, and if the fund manager, who wants to re-deploy the maturity proceeds for 1 more month does not want to take the risk of interest rates going down, he can then enter into a following forward rate agreement (FRA) say as on June 30, 2009:

He can receive 1 X 2 FRA on June 30, 2009 at 6.75% (FRA rate for 1 months lending in 2 months time) on the notional amount of Rs. 50 Crores, with a reference rate of 30 day CP benchmark. If the CP benchmark on the settlement date i.e. July 30, 2009 falls to 6.50%, then the Scheme receives the difference 6.75 - 6.50 i.e. 25 basis points on the notional amount Rs. 50 Crores

Certain risks are inherent to derivative strategies viz. lack of opportunities, inability of derivatives to correlate perfectly with the underlying and execution risks, whereby the rate seen on the screen may not be the rate at which the transaction is executed. For details of risk factors relating to use of derivatives, the investors are advised to refer to Scheme Specific Risk Factors.

Portfolio Turnover

The Scheme is a 3 years close ended capital protection oriented scheme. There would be no subscriptions and redemptions on a daily basis. Under normal circumstances, debt portion of the Scheme will be passively managed except in cases where the Scheme is either churning to re-invest for higher yield or churning to liquidate instruments whose credit quality has gone below LAAA equivalent. In view of the nature of the Scheme, there is likely to be no turnover in the portfolio of the Scheme (except for change in composition of portfolio of securities made as per the prevailing market conditions like changes in interest rate policy announced by RBI, shifts in the yield curve, credit rating changes etc.) of the Scheme. In case of equity component in the Scheme, the Fund Manager may buy/sell equity and equity related instruments based on opportunities prevailing from time to time. However, it is difficult to measure with reasonable accuracy, the likely turnover in the portfolio of the Scheme.

Investment By The AMC In The Scheme

The AMC may invest in the Scheme during the New Fund Offer Period. In addition, the AMC may purchase units of the Scheme directly from the Stock Exchange(s) after the Units are listed on the Stock Exchange, subject to the SEBI (MF) Regulations. As per the existing SEBI (MF) Regulations, the AMC will not charge investment management and advisory fee on the investment made by it in the Scheme or other existing schemes of the Mutual Fund.

F. FUNDAMENTAL ATTRIBUTES

In terms of Regulation 18 (15A) of the SEBI (MF) Regulations, following are the Fundamental attributes of the Scheme:

i) Type of Scheme

A 3 year Close Ended Capital Protection Oriented Scheme.

ii) Investment Objectives

To protect capital by investing in high quality fixed income securities and to generate capital appreciation by investing in equity and equity related instruments.

The Scheme is 'oriented towards protection of capital' and 'not with guaranteed returns'.

Investment Pattern

The tentative debt and/or money market instruments and Equity & Equity Related Instruments portfolio break-up with minimum and maximum asset allocation is disclosed in section on asset allocation pattern.

iii) Terms of Issue

- Liquidity provisions:

The Units of the Scheme cannot be redeemed by the Unit holders directly with the Fund until the Maturity Date / Final Redemption Date. The Units of the Scheme will be listed on the capital market segment of NSE.

Further, the AMC/Mutual Fund may at its sole discretion list Units on any other recognized Stock Exchange(s).

Unit holders can purchase / sell Units on a continuous basis on NSE and any other Stock Exchange(s) on which the Units are listed. The Units can be purchased / sold during the trading hours of the Stock Exchange(s) like any other publicly traded stock. The trading of Units on NSE and any other Stock Exchange(s) on which the Units are listed will automatically get suspended one Business Day prior to the record date for redemption of Units on Maturity Date / Final Redemption Date.

The price of the Units on the Stock Exchange(s) will depend on demand and supply at that point of time and underlying NAV. There is no minimum investment, although Units are normally traded in round lot of 1 Unit.

Please refer to para “Settlement of purchase / sale of Units of the Scheme on NSE” and “Rolling Settlement” under the heading Cut off timing for subscriptions/redemption/switches on Page 24 and section “Redemption” on Page 25 & 26, for further details.

- Aggregate fees and expenses

Please refer to section IV B. ‘Fees and Expenses’ on Page 31 of this document.

- Any safety net or guarantee provided

This Scheme does not provide any safety net or guaranteed or assured returns.

In accordance with Regulation 18(15A) of the SEBI (MF) Regulations, the Trustees shall ensure that no change in the fundamental attributes of the Scheme(s) and the plan(s) / option(s) there under or the trust or fee and expenses payable or any other change which would modify the Scheme(s) and the plan(s) / option(s) there under and affect the interests of Unit holders is carried out unless:

- A written communication about the proposed change is sent to each Unit holder and an advertisement is given in one English daily newspaper having nationwide circulation as well as in a newspaper published in the language of the region where the Head Office of the Mutual Fund is situated; and
- The Unit holders are given an option for a period of 30 days to exit at the prevailing Net Asset Value without any exit load.

G. BENCHMARK INDEX

The Benchmark index for the Scheme is CRISIL MIP Blended Fund Index.

About CRISIL MIP Blended Fund Index:

The CRISIL MIP (Monthly Income Plan) Blended Fund Index is designed to track the returns on a MIP Portfolio that includes equity instruments and also the debt Instruments like CBLOs, Commercial Paper, Certificate of Deposit, Government Securities and also corporate bonds. This index has been arrived at by CRISIL in consultation with AMFI for benchmarking the performance of the individual MIP funds in the India against an Index that is representative of the universe of MIP funds. CRISIL MIP Blended Fund Index approved by AMFI, is used by the various mutual

funds to benchmark the individual performance of a particular fund against the performance of a particular of an MIP Index consisting of an ideal mix of the equity and non-equity instruments. (Source: www.amfiindia.com)

As Religare Capital Protection Oriented Fund will be investing in debt & money market instruments and will have an exposure to equity and equity related instruments, considering the asset allocation of the Scheme, CRISIL MIP Blended Fund Index is a most appropriate index for the Scheme.

The Trustee / AMC reserve the right to change the benchmark for evaluation of performance of the Scheme from time to time in conformity with the investment objectives and appropriateness of the benchmark subject to the SEBI (MF) Regulations and other prevailing guidelines.

H. FUND MANAGERS FOR THE SCHEME

Mr. Sujoy Kumar Das (for debt investments) and Mr. Vetri Subramaniam (for equity investments) are the fund managers of the Scheme.

Sujoy, age 38 years, is an Economics Graduate and holds Post Graduate Diploma in Business Administration with specialization in finance & international business. He has more than 14 years of experience in the BFSI space, which includes around 10 years of experience in asset management business. He has worked with Bharti AXA Investment Managers Pvt. Ltd. as Head - Fixed Income (Sept. 2007 - Aug. 2010). He has also worked with DSP Merrill Lynch Fund Managers Ltd. as Fund Manager (Oct. 2000 - Aug. 2007) and Bank of Punjab Ltd. as Senior Manager - Treasury (Jun. 1996 - Oct. 2000)

Mr. Sujoy Kumar Das is also managing Religare Liquid Fund, Religare Ultra Short Term Fund, Religare Active Income Fund, Religare Short Term Plan, Religare Gilt Fund, Religare Overnight Fund and Religare Fixed Maturity Plans.

Vetri, age 40 years, is a Commerce Graduate and holds Post Graduate Degree in Management with specialization in finance from Indian Institute of Management, Bangalore. He has more than 18 years of experience, which includes 16 years of experience in Indian equity markets. He has worked with Motilal Oswal Securities Ltd., Mumbai as Chief Investment Officer (Nov 2007 - May 2008). He was a partner in Capris Investment Management (Aug 2003 - Oct 2007). His earlier assignments include stints with companies such as Kotak Mahindra Asset Management Company Ltd. (Sept 2001 - Aug 2003), SSKI Investor Services Ltd (Sharekhan.com) (Apr 1999 - Aug 2001) and SS Kantilal Ishwarlal Securities Pvt. Ltd., Mumbai (Oct 1996 - Apr 1999).

I. INVESTMENT RESTRICTIONS

Pursuant to Regulations, specifically the seventh schedule and amendments thereto, the following investment restrictions are currently applicable to the Scheme:

- 1) The Scheme shall not invest more than 15% of its NAV in debt instruments (irrespective of residual maturity period above or below one year) issued by a single issuer, which are rated not below investment grade by a credit rating agency authorized to

carryoutsuchactivitiesundertheSEBIAct,1992.Suchinvestment limit may be extended to 20% of the NAV of the Scheme with the prior approval of the Board of Trustees and the Board of Asset Management Company.

Provided that such limit shall not be applicable for investments in Government securities.

Provided further that investments within such limit can be made in the mortgaged backed securitised debt, which are rated not below investment grade by a credit rating agency, registered with SEBI.

- 2) The Scheme shall not invest more than 30% of its NAV in money market instruments of an issuer.
Provided that such limit shall not be applicable for investments in Government securities, treasury bills and collateral borrowing and lending obligations.
- 3) The Scheme will not make investments in unrated debt instruments.
- 4) The Scheme shall not invest more than 10 per cent of its NAV in equity shares or equity related instruments of any company and in listed securities/units of Venture Capital Funds.
- 5) The Scheme shall not invest more than 10% of its NAV in unlisted equity shares or equity related instruments and in unlisted securities/units of Venture Capital Funds.
- 6) The Mutual Fund under all its Scheme(s) shall not own more than ten per cent of any company's paid up capital carrying voting rights.
- 7) The Scheme may invest in other schemes of the Mutual Fund or any other mutual fund without charging any fees, provided the aggregate inter-scheme investment made by all the schemes under the same management or in schemes under the management of any other asset management company shall not exceed 5% of the Net Asset Value of the Fund.
- 8) The Scheme shall not make any investment in:
 - i any unlisted security of an associate or group company of the sponsor; or
 - ii any security issued by way of private placement by an associate or group company of the sponsor; or
 - iii the listed securities of group companies of the sponsor which is in excess of 25% of the net assets.
- 9) The Mutual Fund shall get the securities purchased transferred in the name of the Fund on account of the concerned Scheme, wherever investments are intended to be of a long-term nature.
- 10) Transfer of investments from one scheme to another scheme in the same Mutual Fund is permitted provided:
 - i such transfers are done at the prevailing market price for quoted instruments on spot basis (spot basis shall have the same meaning as specified by a Stock Exchange for spot transactions); and
 - ii the securities so transferred shall be in conformity with the investment objective of the scheme to which such transfer has been made.
- 11) The Mutual Fund shall buy and sell securities on the basis of deliveries and shall in all cases of purchases, take delivery of relevant securities and in all cases of sale, deliver the securities:
Provided that the Mutual Fund may engage in short selling of securities in accordance with the framework relating to short selling and securities lending and borrowing specified by SEBI.
Provided further that the Mutual Fund may enter into derivatives transactions in a recognized stock exchange, subject to the framework specified by SEBI.
Provided further that sale of Government security already

contracted for purchase shall be permitted in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Reserve Bank of India in this regard.

- 12) The Scheme shall not make any investment in any fund of funds scheme.
 - 1 The Scheme will comply with the following restrictions for trading in exchange traded derivatives, as specified by SEBI vide its circular DNPDCir-29/2005 dated September 14, 2005 read along with Circular SEBI/DNPDCir-31/2006 dated September 22, 2006:
 - i. **Position limit for the Mutual Fund in equity index options contracts**
 - a. The Mutual Fund position limit in all index options contracts on a particular underlying index shall be Rs. 500 crores or 15% of the total open interest of the market in index options, whichever is higher, per stock exchange.
 - b. This limit would be applicable on open positions in all options contracts on a particular underlying index.
 - ii. **Position limit for the Mutual Fund in equity index futures contracts:**
 - a. The Mutual Fund position limit in all index futures contracts on a particular underlying index shall be Rs.500 crores or 15% of the total open interest of the market in index futures, whichever is higher, per stock exchange.
 - b. This limit would be applicable on open positions in all futures contracts on a particular underlying index.
 - iii. **Additional position limit for hedging**
In addition to the position limits at point (i) and (ii) above, the Mutual Fund may take exposure in equity index derivatives subject to the following limits:
 - a. Short positions in index derivatives (short futures, short calls and long puts) shall not exceed (in notional value) the Mutual Fund's holding of stocks.
 - b. Long positions in index derivatives (long futures, long calls and short puts) shall not exceed (in notional value) the Mutual Fund's holding of cash, government securities, Treasury Bills and similar instruments.
 - iv. **Position limit for Mutual Fund for stock based derivative contracts**
The Mutual Fund position limit in a derivative contract on a particular underlying stock, i.e. stock option contracts and stock futures contracts, is defined in the following manner:-
 - a. For stocks having applicable market-wide position limit ('MWPL') of Rs. 500 crores or more, the combined futures and options position limit shall be 20% of applicable MWPL or Rs. 300 crores, whichever is lower and within which stock futures position cannot exceed 10% of applicable MWPL or Rs. 150 crores, whichever is lower.
 - b. For stocks having applicable MWPL less than Rs. 500 crores, the combined futures and options position limit would be 20% of applicable MWPL and futures position cannot exceed 20% of applicable MWPL or Rs. 50 crores whichever is lower.
 - v. **Position limit for each scheme of a Mutual Fund**
The scheme-wise position limit / disclosure requirements shall be:
 - a. For stock option and stock futures contracts, the gross open position across all derivative contracts on a particular underlying stock of a scheme of a Mutual Fund shall not exceed the higher of 1% of the free float market capitalization (in terms of number of shares)

or

- 5% of the open interest in the derivative contract on a particular underlying stock (in terms of number of contracts).
- b. This position limits shall be applicable on the combined position in all derivative contracts on an underlying stock at a Stock Exchange.
 - c. For index based contracts, Mutual Funds shall disclose the total open interest held by its scheme or all schemes put together in a particular underlying index, if such open interest equals to or exceeds 15% of the open interest of all derivative contracts on that underlying index.

In terms of SEBI circular Cir/IMD/DF/11/2010 dated August 18, 2010, the following additional restrictions shall be applicable to the Scheme w.r.t investment in derivatives:

- i. The cumulative gross exposure through equity, debt and derivative positions should not exceed 100% of the net assets of the scheme.
- ii. The Scheme shall not write options or purchase instruments with embedded written options.
- iii. The total exposure related to option premium paid must not exceed 20% of the net assets of the Scheme.
- iv. Cash or cash equivalents with residual maturity of less than 91 days may be treated as not creating any exposure.
- v. Exposure due to hedging positions may not be included in the above mentioned limits subject to the following:
 - a) Hedging positions are the derivative positions that reduce possible losses on an existing position in securities and till the existing position remains.
 - b) Hedging positions cannot be taken for existing derivative positions. Exposure due to such positions shall have to be added and treated under limits mentioned in Point (i).
 - c) Any derivative instrument used to hedge has the same underlying security as the existing position being hedged.
 - d) The quantity of underlying associated with the derivative position taken for hedging purposes does not exceed the quantity of the existing position against which hedge has been taken.
- vi. The Scheme may enter into plain vanilla interest rate swaps for hedging purposes. The counter party in such transactions has to be an entity recognized as a market maker by RBI. Further, the value of the notional principal in such cases must not exceed the value of respective existing assets being hedged by the Scheme. Exposure to a single counterparty in such transactions should not exceed 10% of the net assets of the Scheme.
- vii. Exposure due to derivative positions taken for hedging purposes in excess of the underlying position against which the hedging position has been taken, shall be treated under the limits mentioned in point (i).

viii. Definition of Exposure in case of Derivative Positions:

Each position taken in derivatives shall have an associated exposure as defined under. Exposure is the maximum possible loss that may occur on a position. However, certain derivative positions may theoretically have unlimited possible loss. Exposure in derivative positions shall be computed as follows:

Position	Exposure
Long Future	Futures Price * Lot Size * Number of Contracts
Short Future	Futures Price * Lot Size * Number of Contracts
Option bought	Option Premium Paid * Lot Size * Number of Contracts.

- 13) Pending deployment of the funds of the Scheme in securities in terms of the investment objective of the Scheme, the AMC may park the funds of the Scheme in short term deposits of scheduled commercial banks, subject to the guidelines issued by SEBI vide its circular dated April 16, 2007 as may be amended from time to time:

The Scheme will comply with the following guidelines/restrictions for parking of funds in short term deposits:

- i. "Short Term" for such parking of funds by the Scheme shall be treated as a period not exceeding 91 days. Such short-term deposits shall be held in the name of the Scheme.
- ii. The Scheme shall not park more than 15% of the net assets in short term deposit(s) of all the scheduled commercial banks put together. However, such limit may be raised to 20% with prior approval of the Trustees.
- iii. Parking of funds in short term deposits of associate and sponsor scheduled commercial banks together shall not exceed 20% of total deployment by the Mutual Fund in short term deposits.
- iv. The Scheme shall not park more than 10% of the net assets in short term deposit(s), with any one scheduled commercial bank including its subsidiaries.
- v. The Scheme shall not park funds in short term deposit of a bank which has invested in that Scheme.

However, the above provisions will not apply to term deposits placed as margins for trading in cash and derivatives market.

- 14) The Scheme shall not advance any loans.
- 15) The Fund shall not borrow except to meet temporary liquidity needs of the Fund for the purpose of repurchase/redemption of Units or payment of interest and/or dividend to the Unit holders. Provided that the Fund shall not borrow more than 20% of the net assets of the individual Scheme and the duration of the borrowing shall not exceed a period of 6 months.

The Scheme will comply with the other Regulations applicable to the investments of Mutual Funds from time to time.

All the investment restrictions will be applicable at the time of making investments.

The AMC/Trustee may alter these above stated restrictions from time to time to the extent the SEBI (MF) Regulations change, so as to permit the Scheme to make its investments in the full spectrum of permitted investments for mutual funds to achieve its respective investment objective.

Upon allotment, an allotment advice will be sent by ordinary post to each Unit holder, stating the number of Units allotted, not later than 5 Business Days from the close of NFO and the Units will be credited to the DP account of the applicant as per the details provided in the application form. If an investor has bought Units, an investor has to pay the purchase amount to the broker/ sub-broker such that the amount paid is realized before the funds pay-in day of the settlement cycle on the NSE. If an investor has sold Units, an investor has to deliver the Units to the broker/sub-broker before the securities pay-in day of the settlement cycle on the NSE. The Units (in the case of Units bought) and the funds (in the case of Units sold) are paid out to the broker on the pay-out day of the settlement cycle on the NSE. The NSE regulations stipulate that the trading member should pay the money or Units to the investor within 24 hours of the pay-out.

If an investor has bought Units, he should give standing instructions for 'Delivery-In' to his/her DP for accepting Units in his/her beneficiary account. An investor should give the details of his/her beneficiary account and the DP-ID of his/her DP to his/her trading member. The trading member will transfer the Units directly to his/her beneficiary account on receipt of the same from NSE's Clearing Corporation.

An investor who has sold Units should instruct his/her Depository Participant (DP) to give 'Delivery Out' instructions to transfer the Units from his/her beneficiary account to the Pool Account of his/her trading member through whom he/she have sold the Units. Rolling Settlement

A penal interest of 15% or such other rate as may be prescribed by SEBI from time to time, will be paid in case the Redemption proceeds are not made within 10 Business Days of the Maturity Date/ Final Redemption.

However, under normal circumstances, the Mutual Fund would endeavor to despatch the Redemption cheque within 4 Business Days from the Maturity Date/ Final Redemption.

Note: The Trustee, at its discretion at a later date, may choose to alter or add other modes of payment.

Further, based on the list provided by the Depositories (NSDL/CDSL) giving the details of the demat account holders and the number of Units held by them in electronic form on the record date fixed for redemption of Units on the Maturity date / Final Redemption date, the Registrars & Transfer Agent will pay the redemption proceeds by forwarding a cheque or directly crediting the bank account linked to the demat account depending on the mode of receipt of redemption proceeds chosen by the Unit holder.

The redemption proceeds will be sent by courier or (if the addressee city is not serviced by the courier) by registered post. The despatch for the purpose of delivery through the courier/postal department, as the case may be, shall be treated as delivery to the investor. The AMC / Registrar are not responsible for any delayed delivery or non-delivery or any consequences thereof, if the despatch has been made correctly as stated in this paragraph.

REDEMPTION BY NRIs / FIIs

Credit balances in the account of an NRI/ FII Unit holder, may be redeemed by such Unit holder in accordance with the procedure described in SID and subject to any procedures laid down by the RBI, if any. Payment to NRI/ FII Unit holders will be subject to the relevant laws/ guidelines of the RBI as are applicable from time to time (also subject to deduction of tax at source as applicable).

In the case of NRIs

- (i) Credited to the NRI investor's NRO account, where the payment for the purchase of the Units redeemed was made out of funds held in NRO account; or
- (ii) Remitted abroad or at the NRI investor's option, credited to his NRE / FCNR / NRO account, where the Units were purchased on repatriation basis and the payment for the purchase of Units redeemed was made by inward remittance through normal banking channels or out of funds held in NRE / FCNR account.

In the case of FIIs

Credit the net amount of redemption proceeds of such Units to the foreign currency account or Non-Resident Rupee Account of the FII investor.

Pursuant to Government of India Notification No. GSR (381) E dated May 3, 2000, transactions which are not specifically prohibited under the Foreign Exchange Management (Current Account Transactions) Rules, 2000 or which are not included in Schedule II (transactions specified in this Schedule require prior approval of the Government of India) or Schedule III (transactions specified in this Schedule require prior approval of Reserve Bank of India) may be permitted by authorized dealers without any monetary/ percentage ceilings subject to compliance with the provisions of Section 10(5) of the Foreign Exchange Management Act, 1999.

Bank Details

In order to protect the interest of Unit holders from fraudulent encashment of cheques, the current SEBI (MF) Regulations has made it mandatory for investors to mention in their application / redemption request, their bank name and account number.

In case of Units held in demat (electronic) mode, the Bank details as available in the Depository records will be used for the credit of redemption proceeds.

The normal processing time may not be applicable in situations where such details are not provided by investors / unit holders. The AMC will not be responsible for any loss arising out of fraudulent encashment of cheques and/ or any delay/ loss in transit.

Delay in payment of redemption / repurchase proceeds

The AMC shall be liable to pay interest to the Unit holders at 15% or such other rate as may be prescribed by SEBI from time to time, in case the redemption/ repurchase proceeds are not made within 10 Business Days of the date of Redemption / repurchase. However, the AMC will not be liable to pay any interest or compensation or any amount otherwise, in case the AMC / Trustee is required to obtain from the investor / Unit holders verification of identity or such other details relating to subscription for Units under any applicable law or as may be requested by a regulatory body or any government authority, which may result in delay in processing the application.

4. **Taxation of Long Term Capital Gains**
 Under Section 112 of the Act, capital gains arising on the transfer of long term capital assets are subject to tax at the rate of 20%. The capital gains will be computed by deducting expenditure incurred in connection with such transfer and indexed cost of acquisition of the unit from the sale consideration. Further, the maximum tax payable on long term capital gains on such units is restricted to 10% of capital gains calculated without indexation of the cost of acquisition.
 The income by way of long term capital gains of a company would be taken into account in computing the book profits and Minimum Alternate Tax payable, if any, u/s 115JB of the Act (irrespective of whether it is exempt u/s 10(38)).
 Further, in case of an individual or HUF where the total income as reduced by the long term capital gains is below the maximum amount not chargeable to tax i.e. Rs. 160,000 in case of all individuals, to Rs. 190,000 in case of women and to Rs.240,000 in case of senior citizens, the long term capital gains shall be reduced to the extent of the shortfall and only the balance long term capital gains will be subject to the flat rate of taxation.
5. **Taxation of Short Term Capital Gains**
 Short term capital gains arising to a unit holder will be taxed at the normal rate applicable to that unit holder as per the provisions of the Act. The capital gains will be computed by deducting expenditure incurred in connection with such transfer and cost of acquisition of the unit from the sale consideration.
 The taxable/total income and the tax payable arising from short term capital gains shall be computed in accordance with the tax rates applicable to the investor.
 Further, in case of an individual or HUF, being a resident, where the total income as reduced by the short term capital gains as per section 111A is below the maximum amount not chargeable to tax i.e. Rs. 160,000 in case of all individuals, to Rs. 190,000 in case of women and to Rs.240,000 in case of senior citizens, the short term capital gains as per section 111A shall be reduced to the extent of the shortfall and only the balance short term capital gains as per section 111A will be subject to the flat rate of taxation.
6. In addition to the aforesaid tax, surcharge at the following rates is also payable:
 In case of foreign companies at the rate of 25% where the total income exceeds Rs.10,000,000
 In case of domestic company at the rate of 75% where the total income exceeds Rs.10,000,000
 In the case of an individual, HUF, Association of Persons ('AOP') or firm, surcharge is NIL.
 An education cess of 3% (inclusive of 1 % of additional cess for Secondary and Higher education) on total income tax payable (including surcharge) is payable by all categories of taxpayers.
7. The capital loss resulting from sale of units would be available for setting off against other capital gains made by the investor and would reduce the tax liability of the investor to that extent. However, losses on transfer of long term capital assets would be allowed to be set-off only against gains from transfer of long-term capital assets and the balance long-term capital loss shall be carried forward separately for a period of eight assessment years to be set off only against long-term capital gains. Further, as the long-term capital gains on sale of units of equity oriented fund are exempt from tax the losses from such units may not be allowed to be set off against other gains.
8. Switching between units of a scheme will be effected by way of redemption of units of the relevant option and reinvestment of the redemption proceeds in the other units selected by the unit holder. Hence switching will attract the same implications as applicable on transfer of such units.
9. Where a person buys any units within a period of three months before the record date and sells such units within nine months after such date, the dividend income on such units being exempt from tax, then the capital loss, if any, on such sale to the extent of dividend income cannot be set off against other gains.
10. Where a person buys units (original units) within a period of three months before the record date, receives bonus units on such original units, and then sells the original units within a period of nine months from the record date and continues to hold the bonus units, then the loss incurred on the original units shall not be allowed to be set off against other profits but shall be deemed to be the cost of acquisition of the bonus units.
11. However, in cases which are not covered by clause 9 above, the cost of acquisition of bonus units for the investors would be NIL, as provided by section 55(2) of the Act.
12. The long term capital gains on transfer of units would be exempt from tax under Section 54EC of the Act, subject to fulfillment of certain conditions specified in the section. This section requires investments in specified bonds. However, if the amount invested is less than the capital gains realized, only proportionate capital gains would be exempt from tax.

13. Where the units are treated as stock in trade and the profits arising from the sale of units are taxed under the head "Profits & Gains of business or profession", the STT paid by the unit holder would be allowed as deduction under section 36(1)(xv) of the Act in computing the total income under the head "Profits or gains of business or profession".
14. As per the provisions of Section 194K and 196A of the Act, no deduction of tax at source shall be made from income credited or paid by a mutual fund to a resident Unit holder.
15. As per circular no. 715 dated August 8, 1995 issued by the CBDT in case of resident Unitholders, no tax is required to be deducted at source from capital gains arising at the time of repurchase or redemption of the units.

Under Section 195 of the Act in case of schemes other than equity oriented scheme, the Mutual Fund is required to deduct tax at source at the rate of 20% on any long-term capital gains arising from units chargeable to tax if the payee Unitholder is a non-resident. In respect to short-term capital gains, tax is required to be deducted at source at the rate of 30% if the payee Unitholder is a non-resident non-corporate and at the rate of 40% if the payee Unitholder is a foreign company in case of schemes other than equity oriented scheme.
16. In addition to the aforesaid tax, surcharge at the following rates is also payable:

In case of foreign companies at the rate of 25% where the total income exceeds Rs.10,000,000.

In case of domestic company at the rate of 7.5% where the total income exceeds Rs.10,000,000

In the case of an individual, HUF or Association of Persons ('AOP') and artificial juridical person, surcharge is NIL

An education cess of 3% (inclusive of 1 % of additional cess for Secondary and Higher education) on total income tax payable (including surcharge) is payable by all categories of taxpayers.
17. Under section 196D of the Act, no tax is required to be deducted at source on income by way of capital gains earned by a Foreign Institutional Investor (FI).
18. As per circular no. 728 dated October 30, 1995 issued by the CBDT, in the case of a remittance to a country with which a Double Tax Avoidance Agreement (DTAA) is in force, the tax should be deducted at the rate provided in the Finance Act of the relevant year or at the rate provided in the DTAA, whichever is more beneficial to the assessee. In order for the Unitholder to obtain the benefit of a lower rate available under a DTAA, the Unitholder will be required to provide the Mutual Fund with a certificate obtained from his Assessing Officer stating his eligibility for the lower rate.
19. As per Section 206AA of the Act, w.e.f 1 April 2010, every person who is entitled to receive any sum or income or amount on which tax is deductible at source, is required to furnish the Permanent Account Number (PAN) to the person responsible for deducting such tax, failing which tax shall be deducted at the rates as per the Act or rates in force or 20% whichever is higher.
20. Mutual Fund units are exempt from wealth tax since they are not treated as an asset for wealth tax purposes as per section 2(ea) of Wealth Tax Act, 1957.
21. Since the provisions of the Gift Tax Act, 1958 have ceased to apply with effect from October 1, 1998, gift of units of mutual funds made on or after October 1, 1998 will not be liable to Gift Tax under the Gift Tax Act, 1958. However, pursuant to the Finance Act, 2009, Section 56 of the Income Tax Act has been amended to provide that the value of any property, including units of mutual funds, received without consideration or for inadequate consideration on or after October 1, 2009 (from persons or in situations other than those exempted under Section 56(2)(vii) of the Act) will be included in the computation of total income of the recipient and be subject to tax.

II. For the Mutual Fund

1. Religare Mutual Fund is a Mutual Fund registered with SEBI and as such is eligible for benefits under Section 10(23D) of the Act. Accordingly, its entire income is exempt from tax.
2. Mutual Funds (other than equity oriented funds) are required to pay dividend distribution tax at the rate of 13.8406% (including surcharge @7.5%, education cess @2% and Secondary and higher education cess at the rate of 1%), in the case of distributions to individuals and HUFs. An increased rate of 22.145% (including surcharge @7.5%, education cess @2% and Secondary and higher education cess at the rate of 1%) is applicable for distributions made to persons other than an individual or a HUF.

D. COMPUTATION OF NAV

The Net Asset Value (NAV) per Unit of the Scheme will be computed by dividing the net assets of the Scheme by the number of Units outstanding on the valuation day. The Mutual Fund will value its investments according to the valuation norms, as specified in Schedule VIII of the SEBI (MF) Regulations, or such norms as may be specified by SEBI from time to time.

The Net Assets Value (NAV) of the Units under the Scheme shall be calculated as shown below:

The NAV shall be calculated up to four decimal places. However, the AMC reserves the right to declare the NAV up to additional decimal places as it deems appropriate.

The AMC will calculate and disclose the first NAV of the Scheme within a period of 10 (ten) Business Days from the date of closure of New Fund Offer period. Subsequently, the NAV will be calculated and disclosed on all the Business Days.

IV. FEES AND EXPENSES

This section outlines the expenses that will be charged to the Scheme. The information provided under this section seeks to assist the investor in understanding the expense structure of the Scheme and types of different fees/ expenses and their percentage that the investor is likely to incur on purchasing and selling the Units of the Scheme.

A. New Fund Offer (NFO) Expenses

These expenses are incurred for the purpose of various activities related to the NFO like sales and distribution fees paid, marketing and advertising, registrar expenses, printing and stationary, bank charges etc.

NFO Expenses of the Scheme will be borne by the AMC/ Trustee/ Sponsor.

B. Annual Scheme Recurring Expenses

These are the fees and expenses for operating the Scheme. These expenses include investment management and advisory fee charged by the AMC, Registrar and Transfer Agents' fee, marketing and selling costs etc. as given in the table below:

The AMC has estimated that upto 2.25 % of the daily average net assets of the Scheme will be charged to the Scheme as expenses. For the actual current expenses being charged, the investor should refer to the website of the Fund.

The purpose of the above table is to assist the investor in understanding the various costs and expenses that an investor in the Scheme will bear directly or indirectly. These estimates have been made in good faith as per the information available with AMC and are based on a corpus size of Rs. 1 Crore under the Scheme and would change to the extent assets are lower or higher. If the corpus size is in excess of Rs. 1 Crore, the above mentioned recurring expenses in the Scheme would change. The expenses under any head may be more or less than as specified in the table above, but the total recurring expenses that can be charged to the Scheme will be subject to limits prescribed from time to time under the SEBI (MF) Regulations.

These estimates have been made in good faith as per the information available to the Investment Manger based on past experience and are

subject to change inter-se. Types of expense charged shall be as per SEBI (MF) Regulations.

Investment Management and Advisory Fees

In terms of the Investment Management Agreement and the Regulations, the AMC is entitled to an investment management and advisory fee at 1.25% per annum of the average net assets for a corpus up to Rs. 100 Crores and at 1.00% per annum for the corpus amount in excess of Rs. 100 Crores.

C. LOAD STRUCTURE

Load is an amount which is paid by the investor to subscribe to the units or to redeem the units from the scheme.

- In case of Indian Sponsor(s), details of all monetary penalties imposed and/ or action taken during the last three years or pending with any financial regulatory body or governmental authority, against Sponsor(s) and/ or the AMC and/ or the Board of Trustees/Trustee Company; for irregularities or for violations in the financial services sector, or for defaults with respect to share holders or debenture holders and depositors, or for economic offences, or for violation of securities law. Details of settlement, if any, arrived at with the aforesaid authorities during the last three years shall also be disclosed.
 - The NSE and NSCCL have levied various penalties/ fines aggregating to approximately Rs. 4.35 million on Religare Securities Ltd ("RSL") during the period from April 2005 till February 4, 2011, for various reasons, including reporting short collection of margins, violations observed during inspection, violation of exposure limits in the future and option segment dealt for and on behalf of various clients, trading in option segment of the NSE, violation of client level limit for trading in specified scrips, clearing shortage, non-submission of UCC details, delay in monthly disclosures and delayed uploading of computer to computer link terminal data.
 - The BSE has levied various penalties/ fines aggregating to approximately Rs. 0.36 million on RSL during the period from April 2005 till February 4, 2011 for various reasons, including violation of trading limits in certain categories of scrips, entering into transaction on behalf of certain specified clients (which led to price rise), violation of intra-day trading limits, violation observed during inspection, violation of trading limits in Z group securities, bad delivery charges, incorrect punching of individual orders in institutional category, late payouts, modification of client codes, etc.
 - In addition to the above, NSDL has through certain letters levied penalties aggregating to approximately Rs. 0.17 million and CDSL has levied a penalty of approximately Rs. 500 since April 2005.
- Details of all enforcement actions taken by SEBI in the last three years and/ or pending with SEBI for the violation of SEBI Act, 1992 and Rules and Regulations framed there under including debarment and/ or suspension and/ or cancellation and/ or imposition of monetary penalty/adjudication/ enquiry proceedings, if any, to which the Sponsor(s) and/ or the AMC and/ or the Board of Trustees/Trustee Company and/ or any of the directors and/ or key personnel (especially the fund managers) of the AMC and Trustee Company were/ are a party. The details of the violation shall also be disclosed.
 - The SEBI in the matters of IFSL Limited, Mega Corporation Limited, Karuna Cables Limited and Millenium Cybertech Limited, issued ad interim orders dated September 28, 2005, October 24, 2005, November 29, 2005 and January 24, 2006, respectively pending investigation, while observing a sharp increase in price and trading volume in respect of the scrips of the above mentioned companies. Pursuant to the said orders, the SEBI has restrained RSL, among other stock brokers from buying, selling or dealing in the specified scrips of the companies mentioned above, directly or indirectly, on behalf of certain promoters, directors and clients specified by the SEBI from the date of the respective orders, until the receipt of further orders from the SEBI. Subsequently, the SEBI has, pursuant to orders dated June 16, 2006, July 24, 2006, July 25, 2006 and September 26, 2006, in the matters of IFSL Limited, Mega Corporation Limited, Karuna Cables Limited and Millenium Cybertech Limited, respectively confirmed the ad interim orders. Subsequently, SEBI disposed off the proceedings against RSL in IFSL; by consent orders disposed of adjudication proceedings in relation to Mega Corporation Limited and Karuna Cables Limited and issued an administrative warning in the matter of Millenium Cybertech Limited and later on vacated the direction issued in Millennium Cybertech. The specific observations issued by SEBI in these matters are as follows:

Subsequently, the SEBI through letter dated March 24, 2006 summoned RSL to appear and provide information in connection with the investigations instituted by SEBI in the said matter. Further, SEBI vide its letter dated May 25, 2009 has appointed an adjudicating officer in this matter. The letter has been duly replied. Further to this SEBI vide its order dated November 23, 2009 has disposed off the proceedings against RSL.
2.	Mega Corporation Limited	The SEBI in its ad interim, ex-parte order dated October 24, 2005 observed that RSL, among other brokers being holders of more than 1% of the share capital of Mega Corporation Limited, contributed significant volume, i.e., up to 19.17% of net purchase, in the trading of shares of the company while dealing on behalf of the interconnected clients. The SEBI through its letter dated February 27, 2007 summoned RSL for production of documents in relation to the alleged aiding and abetting the connected group of clients in creating an artificial depth in the market to generate a buying interest in the scrip and influencing the price of the scrip. RSL has complied with the summons and has provided the requisite comments and documents. Subsequently, SEBI has passed an order dated July 24, 2006 confirming the interim order. Further, the SEBI has, vide its letter dated June 27, 2008, appointed an adjudicating officer jointly in the concerned matter and in the matter of Karuna Cables Limited. Pursuant to the same, RSL has filed an application dated August 18, 2008 for obtaining a consent order in the matter. The SEBI has subsequently intimated that the independent High Powered Advisory Committee has accepted the application of consent orders in the matters of Mega Corporation Limited and Karuna Cables Limited and has recommended that the matter may be settled on a payment of Rs. one million within 15 days of issue of the said letter. RSL has duly remitted the said sum of Rs. one million. Subsequently, vide its consent order dated March 19, 2009, the SEBI has disposed off the adjudication proceedings against RSL in the matters of Mega Corporation Limited and Karuna Cables Limited.

3.	Karuna Cables Limited	The SEBI in its ad interim, ex-parte order dated November 29, 2005 observed that RSL had a concentration of around 14% in terms of gross purchases during the relevant period. The SEBI through its letter dated March 6, 2007 summoned RSL for explanation in relation to nature of transaction, which indicate involvement in manipulation in the market regarding this scrip. RSL has complied with the summons and have provided the requisite comments and documents. Subsequently, SEBI has passed an order dated July 25, 2006 confirming the interim order. Further, the SEBI has vide its letter dated June 27, 2008 appointed an adjudicating officer jointly in the concerned matter and in the matter of Mega corporation Limited. Pursuant to the same, RSL has filed an application dated August 18, 2008 for obtaining a consent order in the matter. The SEBI has subsequently intimated that the independent High Powered Advisory Committee has accepted the application of consent orders in the matters of Mega Corporation Limited and Karuna Cables Limited and has recommended that the matter may be settled on a payment of Rs. one million within 15 days of issue of the said letter. RSL has duly remitted the said sum of Rs. one million. Subsequently, vide its consent order dated March 19, 2009, the SEBI has disposed off the adjudication proceedings against RSL in the matters of Mega Corporation Limited and Karuna Cables Limited.
4.	Millenium Cybertech Limited	The SEBI in its ad interim, ex-parte order dated January 24, 2006 observed that RSL among other brokers, had entered into synchronised deals on behalf of its clients specified in the order, which helped in matching buyers and seller thereby buyers getting desired sellers and vice versa. The SEBI further observed that the promoters of Millenium Cybertech Limited offloaded their shareholding in the company in an alleged arrangement between interconnected clients, who have also appeared in the orders of the SEBI relating to IFSL Limited, Mega Corporation Limited and Karuna Cables Limited to manipulate the shares of 'low cap' companies and that the same would not have been possible without being guided by a few brokers. Separately, in the same order, the SEBI noted that RSL was among the few brokers who have also appeared in some of the orders passed by the SEBI in the case of 'low cap' stocks. Subsequently, the SEBI through its letter dated April 7, 2006 summoned RSL to appear and provide information in connection with the investigations instituted by the SEBI in the said matter. The information required by the SEBI has been duly provided. Further, an order has been passed on September 26, 2006 by the SEBI confirming the interim order. Finally, the SEBI vide its letter dated May 22, 2007 has issued an administrative warning in the concerned matter. Further, SEBI vide its order dated March 13, 2010 has vacated the directions issued vide its ad-interim ex parte Order dated January 24, 2006 against RSL.

- (b) Pursuant to an inspection of books and records of PMS division of RSL for the period September 2004 to December 2005, SEBI has initiated an inquiry officer proceeding vide its letter dated November 8, 2007. The company has duly submitted its reply to SEBI vide its letter dated December 10, 2007 along with necessary documentary evidence denying the observations contained in the show cause notice of the Enquiry Officer. Further, SEBI vide its letter dated March 25, 2009 has issued a notice for conducting a hearing on April 24, 2009 in the concerned matter, which was duly attended by the company officials and submissions were made. Pursuant to above SEBI has issued a Show Cause Notice dated October 22, 2009 under Regulation 28 of SEBI (Intermediaries) Regulations 2008 as to why appropriate penalty, as Designated Member consider appropriate should not be imposed on RSL. RSL has submitted its reply to the notice. RSL has also been granted a personal hearing on January 8, 2010 in relation to the above show cause as per the letter from SEBI dated December 11, 2009. As the certificate of registration under the Portfolio Manager Regulations was transferred to RAMCL from RSL, RAMCL has now made an application for consent order dated January 12, 2010. Further SEBI vide its letter March 2, 2010 granted RSL an opportunity to attend Internal Committee Meeting on March 11, 2010 with SEBI officials and present the case. The meeting was duly attended by the officials of the Company. SEBI vide its letter dated May 18, 2010 has communicated that the panel of Whole Time Members, SEBI have not accepted the terms of consent. Accordingly, the Company has filed application for consent order with revised terms of settlement on May 21, 2010. SEBI vide its consent order dated September 27, 2010 has disposed of the proceedings initiated vide Show Cause Notice dated October 22, 2009.
- (c) Pursuant to an inspection of books and records of Broking and Depository division conducted by the SEBI, it has thereafter vide its letter dated November 30, 2009 initiated adjudicating proceedings against RSL for the alleged violation of the SEBI Act, the Depositories Act, 1996, the Stock Broker Regulations, the Depository Regulations and certain SEBI circulars. RSL has duly replied to the letter. Further SEBI vide its letter dated July 7, 2010 has in order to conduct inquiry in the matter granted opportunity of hearing to RSL, which was duly attended by the RSL officials. SEBI vide its Order dated November 10, 2010 imposed total penalty of Rs 3 Lacs on certain violations observed. RSL is contesting the same. RSL on January 17, 2011 has filed an appeal with The Securities Appellate Tribunal (SAT) against the order of adjudication officer.
- (d) In case of TV commercial of Religare PSU Equity Fund, as open ended equity scheme, SEBI vide its show cause notice dated November 13, 2009 stated that the display and voice over for standard warning was less than 5 seconds and was unintelligible. The AMC has filed its response with relevant supporting documents stating that display and voice over for standard warning in TVC was 5 seconds and intelligible. SEBI granted personal hearing before the Whole Time Member, SEBI. After considering the submission made by the AMC, Whole Time Member, SEBI vide its order dated February 9, 2010 disposed of the proceeding initiated vide the show cause notice dated November 13, 2009 with a direction to the AMC, Mutual Fund and CEO of AMC to abide strictly by the stipulations on advertisement by mutual funds, issued by SEBI from time to time, both in letter and spirit.

4. Any pending material civil or criminal litigation incidental to the business of the Mutual Fund to which the Sponsor(s) and/or the AMC and/or the Board of Trustees/Trustee Company and/or any of the directors and/or key personnel are a party should also be disclosed separately.
